FISHIN' FOR A CURE:

Co-op employee spearheads tournament for childhood cancer

tatistics show that one in every 285 children will be diagnosed with cancer. For Tyler Schlosser, staking technician at Roughrider Electric Cooperative, the number was more than a statistic as he supported his best friend through his battle with cancer.

Schlosser grew up with Matt Siegle in Glendive, Mont. While they were in high school, 17-year-old Siegle was diagnosed with osteosarcoma. He traveled to Texas to receive chemotherapy treatment, along with countless other minors who were fighting various forms of the disease.

"After Matt saw all the struggles children and families were facing, he wanted to do something to help," Schlosser said.

His desire for no more suffering for young children prompted Siegle to start his dream foundation, "Fishin' For The Cure," with money raised used to fund research in hopes of finding a cure for childhood cancer. It was established in 2008, the year in which Siegle fittingly caught the largest walleye, Schlosser noted.

Unfortunately, Schlosser lost his best friend and fishing buddy after seven years of battling bone cancer. Though Siegle lost his personal battle in August 2010, his legacy lives through the dedication of his family and friends, who hold an annual fishing tournament in his honor in Montana and North Dakota.

Each year, over 100 boats hit the waters to share the message that "cancer bites" and donate proceeds to help fund research for childhood cancer. The goal since the beginning was to not only raise awareness of childhood cancer, but to raise funds to support childhood cancer research, clinical trials, and patient and family services.

"Childhood cancers only receive 4% of the federal funding dollars, and in the past 25 years, only two new drugs have been developed," Schlosser said. "Without small groups like ours to push for funding for these rare diseases, hope is minimal."

The event takes place in both North Dakota and Montana, and together they raise over \$50,000 annually.

"We have partnered with Solving Kids Cancer, based in New York, to direct most of our funds toward research trials for the most deadly and understudied cancer types. We also have sponsor families each year who receive funds from the event to put toward medical expenses," Schlosser said.

This year, the event will take place June 18 at Beulah Bay.

"Besides the fishing tournament, we have meals, a dunk tank, live and silent auction, helicopter rides for two, jump houses and face painting," Schlosser said.

"Honestly, the best part of coaching our team is being able to encourage the girls to get better at the activity and helping them grow within the sport," he said.


Hysjulien credits the community of Hazen in allowing fast-pitch softball to happen.

Safety above all else

ay is Electrical Safety Month. While we all depend on electricity to power our lives, accidents can happen when electricity is improperly used.

That is why safety is the top priority at Roughrider Electric Cooperative. Over time, the cooperative has created a culture of safety

by putting our employees' safety and that of the community above all else.

Roughrider Electric's mission is to provide safe, affordable and reliable electric service to its member-owners. At the end of the day, we strive to deliver affordable and reliable electricity to our member-owners. But, more importantly, we want to return our employees home safely to their loved ones and keep our members safe. To do this requires ongoing focus, dedication and vigilance.

Following leading national safety standards

Working with electricity is an inherently dangerous job, especially for lineworkers. Roughrider Electric Cooperative has a safety coordinator whose focus is keeping employees and the community safe around electricity. We established and follow safety protocols based on leading national safety practices for the utility industry. We require our lineworkers to wear specialized equipment when working next to or with power lines. Our lineworkers follow specific protocols when dealing with electricity.

As importantly, we encourage all our crews to speak up and hold each other accountable for safety. By cultivating a culture of openness and transparency, we promote problem-solving with regard to safety. We examine the information and data gleaned from near misses and accident reports to discern patterns, and use safety metrics to improve in those areas where we have fallen short.

Keeping the community safe

Because we live and work in the community we serve, we care about our neighbors and their safety. We continue to share safety information with our members through our social media, website and our monthly "Safety Starts With ME" articles, which can help members learn what they can do to stay safe.

With it being National Electrical Safety Month, we want to encourage you to keep electrical safety in mind. According to the Electrical Safety Foundation, thousands of people in the United States are critically injured and electrocuted as a result of electrical fires, accidents and electrocution in their own homes each year. Many of these accidents are preventable. There are many things you can do to keep yourself and your community safe around electricity, including:

- Do not attempt to do electrical projects that could overload your outlets.
- Do not use any extension cords that are cracked, frayed or damaged.
- Report downed power lines, unlocked substations or pad-mounted transformers that look amiss.

Be mindful when it comes to electrical safety. Pause and take the extra time to plug into safety. ■

Safety Starts with ME: Russel Goodwin

ast year in North Dakota, over 100,000 acres burned from grassfires and wildfires – a dramatic increase from previous years.

The effects of a drought cycle have left North Dakotans more susceptible to fire.

"As your local cooperative, Roughrider takes these growing threats seriously," said Russel Goodwin, electrician foreman, Hazen. "Our cooperative has continuously embraced a proactive approach to fire prevention."

Roughrider Electric Cooperative's goal is the safety of its members and the protection of the communities where they live. Roughrider Electric has implemented a fire mitigiation plan, which includes many practices and strategies to minimize the possibly of fire.

The line crews routinely receive hazard recognition and fire extinguisher training. In addition to training, the trucks are equipped with fire extinguishers and flappers, and a water sprayer that can be used in extreme drought situations.

"We receive training from the statewide organization that creates a fire simulation and we are required to put it out firsthand, using proper techniques," Goodwin said.

In addition, Roughrider Electric works with other utilities and regional transmission operators to avoid fire issues, which may include not automatically reclosing the transmission line and breaker operations.

"Our employees are advised to be cautious and on the lookout for smoke and fire hazards while working, in addition to performing routine line patrols on the system to avoid any issues of tress or brush that may be near the distribution lines," Goodwin said.

Members can also help reduce the risks of fires:

- Do not stack hay or other materials under power lines.
- If you see an unattended fire, immediately call
 911 or your local fire department.
- Report any trees that appear to be too close to power lines, and keep your own trees and



bushes regularly trimmed.

- Completely extinguish all campfires and firepits after use. Follow all local ordinances to make sure burning a fire is allowed.
- Never throw cigarettes outside a moving vehicle or on the ground.
- In addition, if you do happen to be affected by a fire, please notify the cooperative so we can ensure pole reliability.

Please keep in mind that not all of the capital credit amounts are large, but we would like to get these checks to the proper parties. Persons who wish to claim checks from the following list should be prepared to provide proper personal identification.

What are capital credits?

Roughrider Electric is a nonprofit business. We exist only to provide goods and services to you, our members, not to make a profit for a shareholder or investor. Cooperatives are operated to provide at-cost electric service to their members. When all the expenses are paid, the cooperative's margins are credited to you in the form of capital credits. As the financial condition of your cooperative allows, you are paid these capital credits. In the meantime, your capital credits are your equity in the cooperative.

Refunds are allocated based on the amount of business a member does with the cooperative – the more electricity used, the larger the capital credit check. If you have questions about your capital credits or would like a more detailed explanation, contact Roughrider Electric Cooperative at 800-748-5533. ■

Your electric cooperative is not owned by faraway investors, and it is not overseen by an appointed board of directors. Your electric cooperative is operated by a democratically elected board that is given the privilege to serve because of your vote.

The annual meeting notice will be sent to all members via mail in May.

Voting instructions

Voting by mail is authorized by Roughrider Electric Cooperative's bylaws and will be offered to members in connection with the June 1 annual meeting. Ballots and instructions will be mailed prior to the annual meeting. Under the bylaws, no nominations are accepted from the floor at the annual meeting. A qualified member of Roughrider Electric Cooperative may become a candidate for election by being nominated by the Nominating Committee or by a petition submitted not less than 60 days before the meeting and which has been signed by at least 15 members.

Mail-in ballots will only be sent to members who request them. All ballots mailed or hand-delivered must be received by the cooperative no later than 4 p.m. CT Thursday, May 26.

Please note: Members attending the annual meeting in-person who have previously voted by mail-in ballot will not be entitled to vote at the annual meeting. Their prior submission will constitute their vote(s) on the items on the ballot.
