EXPERIENCE OF A LIFETIME: Quinlivan chosen for Youth Tour

Each year, Roughrider Electric Cooperative sponsors one student to participate in a once-in-a-lifetime experience in Washington, D.C., for the Electric Cooperative Youth Tour. A longstanding cooperative program, the Youth Tour immerses students in American history for a week. While in Washington, D.C., students learn more about electric

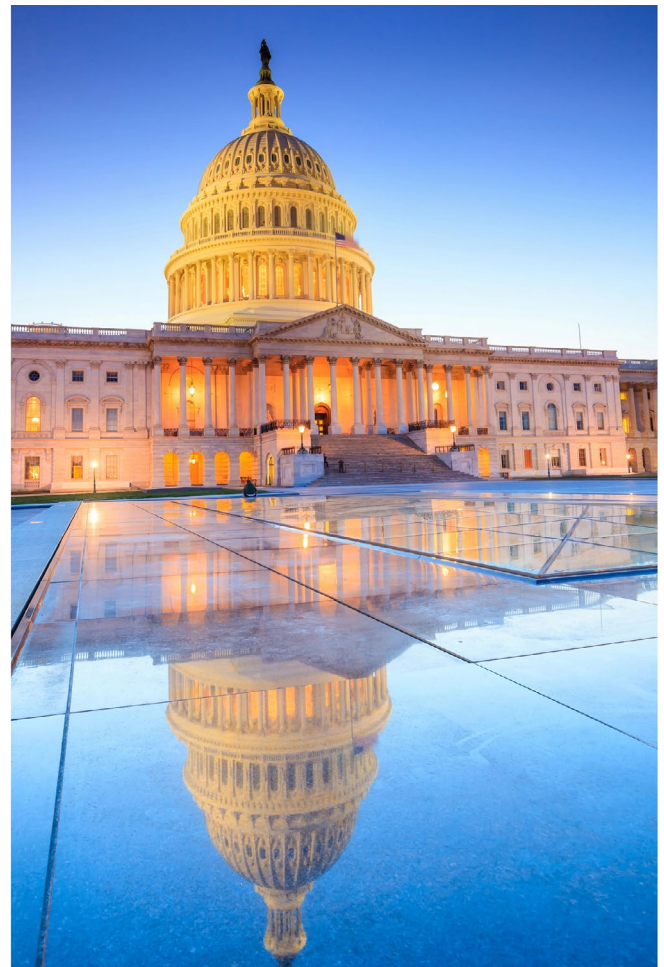
cooperatives, visit national monuments and meet North Dakota's congressional delegation. Through this experience, students gain life skills, meet new people and make unforgettable memories.

Caiden Quinlivan, the son of Steven and Jill Quinlivan and a junior at Center-Stanton High School, was chosen as this year's Youth Tour winner.

To apply for the Youth Tour, sophomores and juniors who are dependents of Roughrider Electric members may submit an application which includes an essay in response to a question set forth by the North Dakota Association of Rural Electric Cooperatives. This year's essay question was: "Why is it important to be involved in your community, and how does that prepare you to be a future leader?"

Caiden notes he is active in 4-H, robotics club, drama club, speech, band and various other school activities. Through these opportunities, he has had a chance to take a step further in leadership, he says. Through drama club and while preparing for the one-act play last year, he was able to help with multiple facets of the play in a director position. He leads the fundraising and outreach program for the robotics club. Another influence on his essay was his recent experience at the North Dakota Leadership Seminar, which is a program that teaches about servant leadership, which Caiden uses in his day-to-day life.

Caiden heard about the Youth Tour opportunity from his parents, but he has a passion for the political



process. This isn't his first time in Washington, D.C., as he recalls a trip with his aunt, but the Youth Tour will be more of a closeup view of Washington, D.C.

Caiden's winning essay:

I moved to Center during the summer between fifth and sixth grade. It was a significant change for me, coming from Braddock, where the only things left in town were a bar and a church. In comparison, Center was a pond to the fishbowl I had been in. It may have been tempting to fall back on myself and cower from this new environment. Instead, I reached out. I joined multiple activities, most of them based in the school. I currently participate in or have participated in 4-H, robotics, science club, drama, acalympics, speech, student council, National Honor Society, Sources of Strength, band, pep band, jazz band and choir.

All of these activities provide opportunities to get involved with my community and those around me. I've participated in community performances in music, drama and speech. I've helped put on events for the community in robotics and science club. In 4-H, my club, the Manley Mixers, participates in the Old Settlers Day parade and the Oliver County fair, in addition to decorating the flower box display in Center. These club activities provide something for those in the community to participate in during the school year, especially during winter.

I've grown as a leader through these activities and opportunities to be involved with my community. I represented Center at the North Dakota Leadership Seminar (NDLS), where I was recognized from my

group as an outstanding leader. Since then, I've been elected to a position on the NDLS alumni board. I also am a major organizer of the community events through my activities and serve in leadership positions within these activities.

One of the most important concepts I've heard is that of "servant leadership." To me, it means being a leader requires putting the needs of the community before my own. Only by being active in my community can I truly be a leader. I try to embody this sentiment by organizing events for my community. I donate my time to stay late at school, plan for events, set them up and ensure everything goes smoothly. One example of this is during the one-act play. Our director had recently transferred to another school, so I stepped up and offered to assist in directing to ensure we had a drama program this year.

Being a participant in my community has helped me develop traits that will help in any future leadership roles. I have become dedicated, willing to put in time to see objectives through. I have become both an active listener and an active voice, willing to listen to members of the community and speak up for them. I have become a better communicator, and I am able to cooperate and lead a team to accomplish our goals. In general, I am more capable and ready to take on whatever may face me as a leader. ■

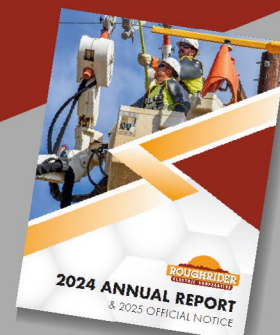
Your Roughrider Electric team will be ready to answer any energy-related questions you may have. We look forward to seeing you at your annual meeting on June 4 in Dickinson. ■

SAFETY STARTS WITH ME: Electrical Safety Month

May is recognized as Electrical Safety Month, but we know the importance of practicing safety year-round. From our cooperative crews to you, the members we serve, we recognize everyone has a part to play in prioritizing safety.

“As a cooperative team, safety is a top priority, from the office to the field and even at home,” says Brandon Braun, journeyman lineworker. “Keeping our members safe is just as important to us as keeping each other safe.”

Here are a few practical safety tips to use around the home, office, shop or school.

- **Frayed wires pose a serious safety hazard.** Power cords can become damaged or frayed from age, heavy use or excessive current flow through the wiring. If cords become frayed or cut, replace them, as they could cause a shock when handled.
- **Avoid overloading circuits.** Circuits can only cope with a limited amount of electricity. Overload happens when you draw more electricity than a circuit can safely handle by having too many devices on one circuit.
- **Label circuit breakers to understand the circuits in your home.** Contact a qualified electrician if your home is more than 40 years old and you need to install multiple large appliances that consume large amounts of electricity.
- **Use extension cords properly.** Never plug an extension cord into another extension cord. If you “daisy chain” them together, it could lead to overheating, creating a potential fire hazard. Don’t exceed the wattage of the cord. Doing so also creates a risk of overloading the cord and creating



a fire hazard. Extension cords should not be used as permanent solutions. If you need additional outlets, contact a licensed electrician to help.

Our top priority is providing reliable electrical service to power homes, schools and businesses in our community year-round. But equally important is keeping our community safe around electricity.

If you see something that looks unsafe on a power line or around a substation, give us a call so we can evaluate the situation. ■
