



Roughrider Electric Cooperative, Inc. MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MEMBERS

JUNE 1, 2022

Roughrider Electric Cooperative, Inc. (Roughrider) held its Annual Meeting of Members at Hazen High School in Hazen, North Dakota, on June 1, 2022, beginning at 6:30 p.m., Central Time.

The President of the Board, Roger Kudrna, who presided over the meeting, called the meeting to order and welcomed the members to Roughrider's 15th annual meeting. The Cooperative's attorney, Jennifer Grosz, kept the minutes of the meeting.

Mr. Kudrna welcomed the members. He thanked the many who worked hard to make the meeting a success, and he thanked Hazen Public Schools for the use of its facility and parking lot. He also thanked Union State Bank for its contributions towards the night's meal. He then led the membership in saying the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Roughrider Director Arnold Kainz gave the invocation. After the invocation, Hazen's Mayor Jerry Obenauer gave a welcoming address to the membership.

Mr. Kudrna reported that the Bylaws require 50 members be registered for a quorum. Ms. Laurie Miller reported that 104 members are in attendance. Mr. Kudrna declared that a quorum existed for the transaction of business.

Mr. Kudrna appointed Jennifer Grosz, Roughrider's lawyer, as parliamentarian for the meeting and announced that she would conduct the meeting according to Roberts Rules of Order.

At this time, Mr. Kudrna asked if the membership would be willing to dispense with the reading of the official Notice of Annual Meeting and the minutes of the June 2, 2021, meeting, and approve them. Upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, it was RESOLVED to dispense with the reading of the Notice of Annual Meeting and the minutes and approve them.

Mr. Kudrna asked Roughrider employee Leonard Hibl to draw for some door prizes.

Mr. Kudrna next introduced the Roughrider Board of

Directors present at the meeting, as well as the Cooperative's Co-Managers and counsel.

Mr. Kudrna asked Roughrider employee Leonard Hibl to draw for some door prizes.

Alan Kadrmas served as the Chairman of this year's Nominating Committee. Mr. Kadrmas read the 2022 Nominating Committee Report to the members, and provided the members with the names of those serving on the Nominating Committee. The Committee nominated Mr. William Retterath for the Eastern District director vacancy, Mr. Bruce Darcy for the Central District director vacancy and Mr. Callen Schoch for the Western District director vacancy.

Mr. Kudrna notified the membership that, since there was just one candidate for each district vacancy, the members can entertain a motion to suspend the rules and cast a unanimous ballot. Thereafter, upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, it was RESOLVED to suspend the rules and cast a unanimous ballot for the following directors in the following districts:

Callen Schoch Bruce Darcy William Retterath Western District Central District Eastern District

Mr. Kudrna asked Mr. Hibl to draw for some more door prizes.

Alex Craigmile, Chief Financial Officer for Roughrider, provided the membership his financial report for the 2021. He noted that Roughrider's financials were audited by Brady Martz and Associates, P.C. Roughrider received an unmodified opinion from Brady Martz, which is the highest opinion that can be received and expresses their confidence in the Cooperative's financial record keeping. Among the highlights he explained were: The Cooperative's total revenue for 2021 was \$76,640,233. Mr. Craigmile noted that approximately 75% of the Cooperative's revenue comes from large commercial and industrial loads. Mr. Craigmile reported that cost of power for 2021 was approximately 70% of the entire expense of the Cooperative. Mr. Craigmile highlighted that Roughrider increased its net utility plant in 2021 to \$229,265,456. Member Equity totaled approximately \$115,565,489. Roughrider's long-term debt

increased to \$180,007,165 in 2021. Mr. Craigmile noted that the interest rates on the long-term debt incurred by Roughrider were at extremely low rates. In 2021, Roughrider ended with a margin of \$12,717,597, which will be returned to the Members in the form of capital credits. Upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, it was

RESOLVED that the 2021 Financial Report be approved as presented.

Co-Manager Travis Kupper next provided the membership the Co-Manager's report. He informed the membership that this was Co-Manager Don Franklund's last annual meeting, as he has announced his upcoming retirement. He thanked Mr. Franklund for his dedicated service to the Cooperative. Mr. Kupper discussed the history of cooperatives with the membership, and how that mirrored how Roughrider Electric Cooperative, Inc. was established. Roughrider serves nearly 8,900 members, and has retired over \$60 million in capital credits to the membership. Roughrider's impact extends beyond providing electricity to enriching the communities it serves. He presented a video from Member Service Manager Leonard Hibl which illustrates the Cooperative's activities in its service territory. A video of Operations Manager Jason Bentz was shared with the membership, in which Mr. Bentz outlined the actions being taken by the Cooperative to provide advanced, reliable service to the members. He invited questions from those attending and encouraged any member with questions to contact him or Co-Manager Don Franklund.

Mr. Kudrna announced that the next order of business would be to hear the operation roundup report, have scholarship recipients announced and draw for the "luck of the draw" scholarship winners. He asked Mr. Hibl to come to the stage to perform these reports and drawings. Mr. Hibl provided the membership with a summary of Operation Roundup's activities over the last year.

Mr. Hibl reported to the membership that Roughrider offers scholarships to students for use for their post-secondary education. Each high school in Roughrider's service territory is provided with 1 scholarship to bestow on a deserving student. An additional scholarship is given to a student who attends a school outside the service territory but whose parents reside within and are members of the Cooperative. Basin also provides a \$1,000 scholarship. These scholarship recipients were recognized. There are also three luck of the draw scholarships available to high school seniors attending the annual meeting who has a parent who is a member. These winners were announced and provide with their scholarships: Garret Byerley; Brennan Schmitz and Abigail Hysjulien. Mr. Kudrna reported that there is new business for the membership this year. Proposed Bylaw amendments were previously provided to the membership together with their annual report. Mr. Kudrna stated that Ms. Grosz was available to answer any questions the membership may have about the proposed amendments. Thereafter, upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, it was

RESOLVED, to dispense with the reading of the proposed amended Bylaws.

Thereafter, upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, it was

RESOLVED, that the proposed amendments to the Bylaws are approved as presented.

Mr. Kudrna invited Mr. Franklund to say a few words to the membership. Mr. Franklund reminisced that he has been at every annual meeting of Roughrider since it was established. The Board has been wonderful to work with and they work diligently to solve problems it confronts with the members' interest in the front of their minds. He thanked the members for their support.

Before the meeting was adjourned, Mr. Kudrna stated that each member that registered will receive a \$15 bill credit for attending today's annual meeting. He also thanked Roughrider's staff for their hard work in keeping the lights on. He thanked management for their guidance, legal counsel for her hard work, and his fellow board members for their commitment. He thanked those who serve on the Operation Roundup Board for the good and vital work they do. He thanked the membership most of all for their support of the Cooperative.

Thereafter, upon motion duly made, seconded and unanimously carried, the meeting adjourned at 7:23 p.m.
