Bentz announced as co-general manager/CEO

Lineworkers in the energy industry learn early in their careers they will face various challenges on a regular basis. These challenging conditions prepared Jason Bentz for his new role as co-general manager/CEO of Roughrider Electric Cooperative.

In late 2022, the Roughrider

board of directors announced Bentz would be joining Travis Kupper in leading the cooperative, beginning in 2023.

Serving the cooperatives

From a young age, Bentz recalls his interest in the electric service industry. His basic understanding of the profession came from a cousin who served as a cooperative lineworker for many years.


"I was always interested in being able to work with my hands while being outside. And since I wasn't afraid of heights, I thought I would pursue a career as a lineman," Bentz says.

He pursued his goals, and after receiving the required training from Bismarck State College, Bentz headed out of state to work for Thiel Construction in Nebraska and Oklahoma. During his first transmission job, Bentz remembers feeling validated in his career choice.

"When I was on my first transmission project in Nebraska, I was working on a 230-kilovolt and asked to go unclip wires in preparation for new wires to be pulled in. While on a 90-foot pole, which was situated on top of a 300-foot plateau, I thought, 'Yes, I made the right choice,' as the view was spectacular," he says.

Although Bentz enjoyed working for Thiel Construction, his goal was always to return to his home state of North Dakota. That goal was made a reality when he received a job offer from Mor-Gran-Sou Electric Cooperative in Flasher as an apprentice lineworker.

"I remember my first job at Mor-Gran-Sou Electric was changing out a transformer at a pasture well tap west of Elgin with Foreman Mark Hoffman," he says.

Growing into a cooperative leader

For the next several years, Bentz continued to work his way up in cooperatives, rising from apprentice to journeyman lineworker and foreman.

"I have always wanted to take opportunities and grow with them and try my best to serve others, and give others the opportunities to grow as well," he says.

For 20 years, Bentz did just that at Mor-Gran-Sou Electric Cooperative, before transitioning to operations manager and chief of staff at Roughrider Electric Cooperative in Dickinson, beginning in 2013.

Although Bentz recognizes being a lineworker is not a glamorous or easy profession, the skills learned, including commitment to safety, understanding shortcuts are not an option and a dedication and sense of service, have prepared him for his new role.

This also includes his understanding of working as a team.

"In life, and in a career in the energy industry,

you cannot be very successful without a good team," Bentz says, noting his good fortune of working alongside influential teams and leaders throughout his career, which helped shaped him into the person he is today.

"I have always had good role models and mentors, starting with my parents, who taught me to work hard, to do a job well and to never pretend to know the answers if you don't," Bentz says. "In addition to my parents, the leaders out in the field have taught me to not be afraid to ask questions, and most importantly, always listen to understand."

Bentz looks forward to his new role, and to using the skills he has gained along the way to continue moving the cooperative in the right direction, while working alongside Kupper.

"I will try and make the plans a reality to help our member-cooperatives succeed in an everchanging industry. We need to be mindful of the members and keep providing reliable, affordable power, and keep looking at new technologies," Bentz says.

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Safety Starts with ME: Leonard Hibl

"At Roughrider Electric, we do our best to maintain our system to ensure readiness for all types of severe weather and to reduce the number of outages, but Mother Nature can be unpredictable," said Leonard Hibl, Roughrider's director of key accounts and marketing.

That being said, outages are inevitable. Here at Roughrider, our line crew takes necessary safety precautions when restoring power for you, our members.

However, our line crew's safety remains in your hands. When using portable generators in the event of a downed power line, this can prove to be dangerous and, in some cases, fatal to our lineworkers when used incorrectly.

A generator plugged into a home's wiring or regular household outlet can cause backfeeding along power lines and electrocute anyone that comes into contact with them, even if the line seems deenergized.

Not only does this cause danger for our lineworkers, but also for our members. If a generator is used improperly, generator owners may also be at risk of electrocution, fire injury, property damage or carbon monoxide poisoning.

Here are some tips to ensure you are using a generator correctly:

- Never connect a generator directly to your home's wiring, unless your home has been wired for generator use.
- 2. Always plug appliances directly into generators.
- 3. Use heavy-duty, outdoor-rated extension cords.
- 4. Ensure your generator is properly grounded.
- 5. Never overload a generator.
- 6. Turn off all equipment powered by the generator before shutting it down.
- 7. Keep the generator dry. Operate it on a dry surface under an open structure.
- 8. Always have a fully charged fire extinguisher nearby.
- 9. Never refuel a generator while it is operating.
- 10. Read and adhere to the manufacturer's instructions for safe operation.


