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A HEART FOR HELPING AND CREATIVITY: **Bobbie Barnhardt**

As a 6-year-old, Bobbie Barnhardt would sit at her grandmother's kitchen table, watching as her grandmother skillfully cut out shapes for quilts. Her grandmother would ask her to cut out circles of fabric using a soup can, and it was there the seeds of her future were sown. Early lessons in precision, creativity and patience would later inspire her to turn quilting from a cherished hobby into a business.

As a busy mom of three boys, working four parttime jobs and helping run the family auto body shop, Barnhardt thought there had to be a different way to provide for her family in which she could spend more time with her family and help her husband when needed. It was then her longtime passion of quilting began to take shape, transforming a personal hobby into her new business venture.

In the beginning, Barnhardt quilted from her home in Washburn and quickly realized she was going to need more space to host classes and interact with customers.

"I went into Cottingham Insurance one day to do some business and joked, 'Do you have a broom closet I could rent?" Barnhardt says.

Soon, she was renting an 8x10-foot space from the business until she bought the whole building for her business, Quilting For You. She spent her days helping customers with questions or with their Handi Quilter equipment or materials. Handi Quilter is the brand Barnhardt is certified to sell and service its machines.

In 2021, Barnhardt moved into her shop north of Mandan, where she continues to visit with customers, work on projects and service machines, often via FaceTime, she notes.

Technology has advanced since Barnhardt first began quilting. This includes the longarm sewing machine Barnhardt uses to make her quilting creations. With the longarm machine, she can freehand or use a computer program to stitch.

"It depends on the pattern of the project and what the customer wants," Barnhardt says as she works on a light green quilt with a lamb on it. She says she chose a swirl-like pattern to mimic the lamb's wool.

Barnhardt focuses on edge-to-edge projects at her shop off the highway. Edge-to-edge is a technique where the stitching is the same pattern across the quilt. She says she gets quite a few quilts where the front and the back of the quilt is complete, and she needs to "sandwich" them together, although she is willing to take on anything.

Barnhardt also hosts various classes from beginner to expert levels. These classes are on various projects and

allow people to try out the quilting equipment she has. She says she has had a few high school classes tour her shop. She recalls a recent Center-Stanton High School class she showed around, then sent a quilted pattern with their names designed.

"I am seeing a lot more people taking interest in quilting," Barnhardt notes.

She says she is an open book and is always available for questions and to help others.

Barnhardt offers new and used quilting machines and even allows people to rent, so they can make sure they know what they are getting before they order products from her. She also has a variety of products for quilters to check out by appointment, as she still spends time helping her husband in their auto body shop.

She notes she has a large network of people who can assist if she is unable to assist with a project.

MESSAGE FROM OPERATIONS: Review of 2024

Throughout 2024, Roughrider Electric Cooperative crews worked to improve system reliability by maintaining and upgrading electrical infrastructure. such as poles and substations. Before work begins each year, the engineering staff at the Innovative Energy Alliance Cooperative, a cooperative we are member owners of, develops a work plan using historical information and priorities from our operations team.

This year, crews installed underground power lines, rebuilt substations and provided additional power load capacity to rural communities.

One of the projects completed by Roughrider Electric crews was upgrading the Beulah Bay area from single-phase to three-phase power. Installing three-phase power helps Roughrider Electric ensure there is adequate electric services for projected growth in the area.

Roughrider Electric works to ensure a safe and reliable electric service to members. A way to increase safety and reliability has been to convert overhead power lines to underground power lines, especially in high-traffic areas, such as crossings along Highway 1806 and Highway 25, as well as County Road 27. These routes often have large loads traveling to and from the power plant, mine and other industrial traffic. In 2024, Roughrider Electric installed 450,000 feet of underground power line.

Industries are quickly growing in Roughrider Electric's service area. To accommodate the growth, crews have increased the load capacity to current substations as well as constructed new substations. This summer the Snow substation, west of Manning was completely rebuilt with its capacity almost doubled in size. The Rocky Ridge substation, a newly built substation was brought on line between Marshall and Manning. These substations will help ensure reliability and the opportunity for growth in the area.

The town of Medora is continually expanding, which includes power service Roughrider Electric offers Medora. Roughrider Electric began construction on 12 miles of underground power lines to serve the projected load growth, which includes the Theodore Roosevelt Presidential Library and other town projects.

Looking into the next few weeks of 2024, you may spot Roughrider Electric line crews conducting annual line inspections. If you see them, feel free to give them a wave or say hello, but keep a safe distance, as they may be working on energized line.

Also, as a friendly reminder, if you see any cooperative equipment that looks unsafe and should be assessed by the cooperative, be sure to give the office a call at 800-748-5533. We hope outages are few and far between this winter, but want to encourage you to report outages by calling the office.

Thank you for your support throughout 2024. We look forward to ensuring safe and reliable electric services for you all in 2025! ■

Safety first

- Before decorating begins, remember to always check electrical cords and light strands to make sure they aren't frayed or damaged.
- It is recommended to double check the holiday lights used outside are rated for outdoor use.
- Remember to test your smoke alarms often due to increased cooking and candle enjoyment this time of year.

'Tis the season for savings

- The thermostat is one of the best places for savings, since heating and cooling make up the majority of home energy consumption. Lower the thermostat a few degrees, especially when you have family or friends stopping by.
- Decorate with LED holiday lights. LEDs are the

most energy-efficient lighting options available, and they last much longer than traditional bulbs.

• When cooking this holiday season, remember smaller countertop appliances, such as air fryers and slow cookers, consume a fraction of the energy used to heat an oven.

Consent agenda: There were proposed amendments to the agenda. The agenda was approved as amended.


